Dr. Christina Chang GUEST CONDUCTOR

Composer Timothy Broege, a former public school music teacher and active recitalist on early keyboard instruments and recorder, has written twenty-one Sinfonias for large ensembles. Sinfonia No. 4, a suite for winds and percussion, was composed in 1972 and extensively revised in 2003. Written for the concert band of Manasquan Elementary School, the piece evokes the spirit of youth as it takes the listener on a walk down memory lane. The first movement, without the use of direct quotation, has an air of familiarity, recalling the sounds of television program music from the 1960's and 1970's. The second movement pays homage to young or first-time lovers. The third movement, based on the classic rhythm – and – blues "shave and a haircut – two bits!" rhythm, is a nod to big city "doo-wop" singers gathering under streetlights on warm summer evenings to serenade the apartment dwellers.

The Old Grumbly Bear Julius Fucik/Andrew Glover

Bernard Flythe TUBA

Julius Fucik was a violinist, bassoonist, and military band leader whose compositions numbered well into the hundreds. Born in Prague, Czechoslovakia, he studied music at the Prague Conservatory under the tutelage of Antonin Dvorak. Though known mostly for his military marches, he was also beloved for his light symphonic music, including concert overtures, waltzes, and many marches, the most famous of which is Entry of the Gladiators. The Old Grumbly Bear was originally composed for solo bassoon and orchestra. This charming work humorously depicts the lumbering antics of a slow moving, cantankerous old bear who eventually decides to pick up the pace!

Undertow John Mackey

John Mackey's music has been hailed by The New York Times as "Electrifying: A terse, powerful explosion of transformative energy." This is certainly a fitting description of Undertow. Commissioned by the Hill Country Middle School Band of Austin, TX and dedicated to conductor Cheryl Floyd, this work is driven by meter which oscillates between 7/8 and 4/4, as well as dynamic percussion parts. Vigorous woodwind runs and trills, intermittent bursts of "biting" eighth note figures, and trombone glissandi further characterize this flash of musical lightning.

Concerto for Tuba and Wind Orchestra

Bruce Broughton's Concerto for Tuba and Wind Orchestra is one of the major compositions for solo tuba written within the last fifty years. It challenges the tubist on many levels while remaining tonally based. Each of the three movements explores a different facet of the tuba from technical challenges of speed and dexterity to melodious passages in the upper register that test the virtuosity of the performer.

One of the most versatile composers working today, Bruce Broughton writes in every medium, from theatrical releases and TV feature films to the concert stage and computer games. His first major film score, for the Lawrence Kasdan western Silverado, brought him an Oscar nomination. His very next project, a classically styled score for Barry Levinson's Young Sherlock Holmes, earned a Grammy nomination for the soundtrack album. With over 20 Emmy nominations, Broughton has received a record 10, most recently for HBO's Warm Springs. Major motion picture credits include Lost in Space; Tombstone; Miracle on 34th Street; Carried Away; Baby's Day Out; The Presidio; Narrow Margin; Harry and The Hendersons; Krippendorf's Tribe; Honey, I Blew Up The Kid; The Boy Who Could Fhy; the Disney animated features, The Rescuers Down Under and Bambi II, and the two Homeward Bound adventures. Broughton is a board member of ASCAP, a governor of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, a former governor of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, and past president of The Society of Composers and Lyricists. The Liberty Bell

For \$500 more, this march probably would have been named "The Devil's Deputy." Sousa was composing music for an operetta of that name at the request of the celebrated comedian Francis Wilson. Sousa asked \$1,500 for the work, but Wilson offered \$1,000. When they could not come to an agreement, Sousa withdrew with his partially completed manuscript, which included a lively march. Sousa and George Frederick Hinton, one of the band's managers, were in Chicago witnessing a spectacle called America when a backdrop, with a huge painting of the Liberty Bell, was lowered. Hinton suggested that "The Liberty Bell" would be a good title for Sousa's new march. By coincidence, the next morning Sousa received a letter from his wife in which she told how their son had marched in his first parade in Philadelphia—a parade honoring the return of the Liberty Bell, which had been on tour. The new march was then christened "The Liberty Bell." It was one of the first marches Sousa sold to the John Church Company and was the first composition to bring Sousa a substantial financial reward. This march is better known in the public mind than most other Sousa marches because of its use as theme music by the British comedy troupe Monty Python.

"The March King," John Philip Sousa was born in 1854 in southeast Washington, D.C., near the Marine Barracks where his father Antonio played trombone in the Marine Band. Sousa studied piano and most orchestral instruments, excelling especially on the violin. When at age thirteen young Sousa was almost persuaded to join a circus band, his father intervened, enlisting him as an apprentice musician in the Marine Band. Sousa remained in the band until he was twenty, only to return five years later as the seventeenth director. Sousa was a melodic genius who created some of the most memorable tunes of his day, but he was not above borrowing a good melody. One such opportunity occurred when Sousa heard Marcella Lindh, one of his soprano soloists, whistling a tune of her own creation. Sousa couldn't get the melody out of his head and asked his soprano if he might use it in a march. She agreed, but didn't know that her tune had been used until several and asked his soprano if he might use it in a march.
